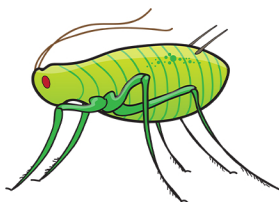


TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: LADYBUGS

All ladybugs have exactly seven spots.

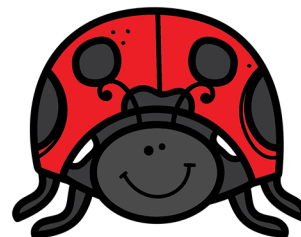
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TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: LADYBUGS
