

# SUNFLOWER SEEDS & WILDLIFE VOCABULARY CARDS



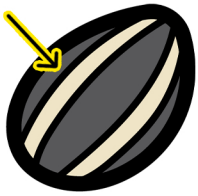
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seed  
dispersal

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The way seeds are moved away from the parent plant so they can grow in new places. Sunflower seeds are spread by animals, wind, and gravity.

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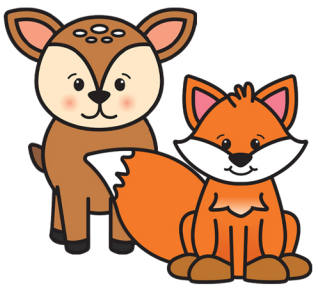
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seed  
coat

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The protective outer covering of a seed. The seed coat keeps the inside of the seed safe until it is ready to sprout.

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wildlife

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Wild animals that live in nature and are not kept as pets. Many animals depend on sunflowers as a food source.

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pollinator

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An animal — often a bee or butterfly — that carries pollen from one flower to another. Pollinators help sunflowers make seeds.

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food  
chain

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The order in which living things depend on each other for food. In a sunflower food chain, the sunflower is a producer and animals that eat the seeds are consumers.

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consumer

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A living thing that eats plants or other animals for food. Birds, squirrels, and people are all consumers that eat sunflower seeds.

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producer

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A living thing, like a plant, that makes its own food using sunlight, water, and air. Sunflowers are producers.

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
