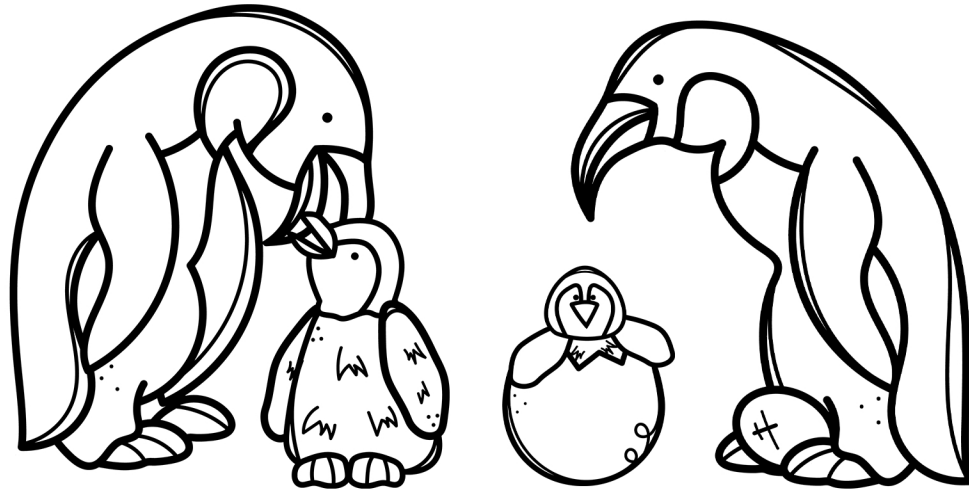

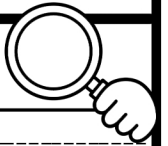

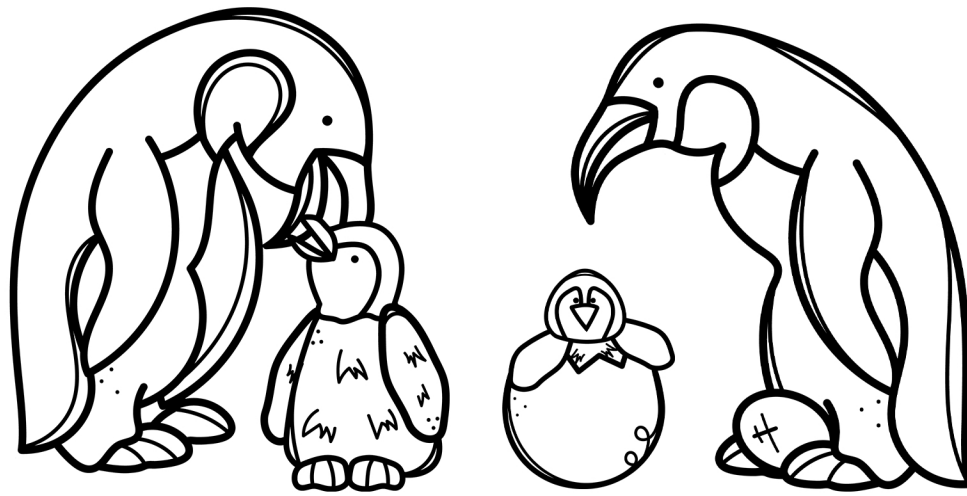
Many penguins migrate, or travel, from one place to another. They do not migrate to escape the cold. Instead, penguins usually migrate to find food or a safe place to raise their chicks. Some penguins swim hundreds of miles across the ocean to reach waters full of fish and krill. Others waddle or slide across the ice to reach their breeding colony, the large group where they lay eggs and raise chicks together. Traveling in a group, or colony, can help penguins stay safer from predators like leopard seals. When the seasons change again, many penguins migrate back to where they started.
