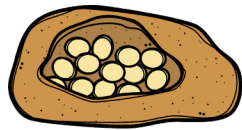


TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: SEA TURTLES

Sea turtles build their nests high up in trees near the beach.

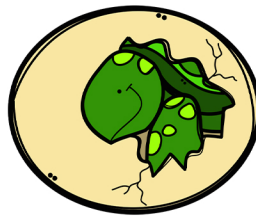
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TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: SEA TURTLES

A hawksbill sea turtle has a pointed, beak-like mouth.

Leatherback sea turtles have a soft, rubbery shell instead of a hard one.

All sea turtles are the exact same size.



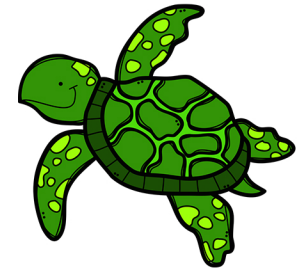
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TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: SEA TURTLES

Sea turtles can sense Earth's magnetic field to help them navigate.

Sea turtles breathe underwater using gills.

Female sea turtles usually return to their birth beach to nest.

Plastic pollution can be mistaken for food by sea turtles.

Ocean trash has no effect on sea turtles.



Protecting nesting beaches helps keep sea turtle eggs safe.

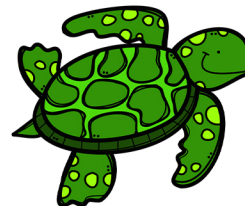
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TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: SEA TURTLES

A streamlined shell helps reduce drag while swimming.



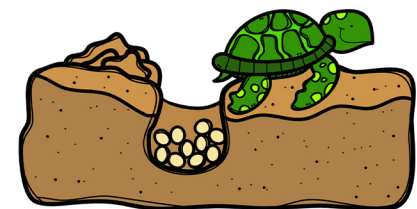
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TWO TRUTHS & A LIE: SEA TURTLES
